



BC MINING AND SMELTING ARE ADVANCING ECONOMIC RECONCILIATION

Our sector is a leader in advancing economic reconciliation with BC's Indigenous peoples, reflecting the principles of the *Declaration Act*:

- Indigenous peoples share in the benefits of mining through numerous, innovative Impact Benefit Agreements
- 46 Indigenous nations have received \$98M in mineral tax payments to date
- Mining is the largest private sector employer of Indigenous peoples in Canada. At the Brucejack and Red Chris mines in Northern BC, more than 30% of the work force is Indigenous
- In 2018, 120 Indigenous suppliers associated with 25 Indigenous nations provided materials, goods or services to BC's 14 operating mines and 2 smelters, valued at \$265 million

BARRIERS TO INNOVATION AND GROWTH

The mining industry supports a rigorous regulatory framework and world class environmental standards

- The competitiveness of BC's mining sector is deteriorating due to escalating costs
- The regulatory framework of today builds the mines of tomorrow; currently, it takes too long and is too complex to permit a mine in British Columbia

Mines are reaching the end of their productive life – if there are no expansions or new mines built, there will only be five mines left in BC by 2040

BC MINING & SMELTING: DRIVING OUR ECONOMIC RECOVERY

To expedite BC's economic recovery:

- 1. Address the Design of the Carbon Tax: Level the playing field with our Canadian and global competitors, protect our workers and mitigate carbon leakage
- 2. Continue and Complete the Regulatory Improvement Project: Improve the effectiveness of BC's stringent regulatory regime with a single window integrated approach that eliminates duplication and overlap across ministries, and reduces costs to the taxpayer and industry
 - a. Pursue a Laser Focus on Permitting and Authorizations for seven key mining projects:

 Enable these projects to get to timely FID and kick-start our economic recovery in rural and urban British Columbia
- 3. Advance the Declaration: Provide guidance and resources to support Provincial decision makers to address growing expectation gaps and advance economic reconciliation and greater project certainty
